MINISTER: (Addressing Groom)

Repeat after me:

to be my wife – to have and to hold – from this day forward – for better, for worse – for richer, for poorer - in sickness and in health - until death do us part.

MINISTER: To bride:

to be my husband – to have and to hold – from this day forward –

or better, for worse - for richer, for poorer - in sickness and in health - until death do us part.

MINISTER: The rings please.
MINISTER: (Addressing Groom)

MINISTER: (Addressing Bride)

With this ring – I thee wed – and with it I give unto you – all the treasures of my mind - of my heart - and of my soul.

MINISTER: The word of God tells us what love is like and what love does. This is an translation of part of I Corinthians, Chapter 13. The Apostle Paul said: "Though I speak in the tongues of men or of angels, if I have no love, I am clanging bell or a tinkling cymbal. Though I prophesy and see into all the mysteries and all hidden knowledge and have faith enough to move mountains, if I have no love, I am nothing. And though I give away all my possessions to feed the poor and offer up my body to be burned, if I have no love, I gain nothing Love is patient, love is kind, is never envious or boastful or conceited, does not act rudely or self-ishly, is not easily angered, does not count up offenses; takes no pleasure in injustice; but rejoices in the truth; includes all things, has faith in all things, hopes for all things, endures all things. Love never ends. If there are prophecies, they will disappear; if there is ecstasy, it will cease; if there is knowledge it will vanish... Optional: (more for first marrieds) From Matthew

Have ye not read that He who made them from the beginning, made them male and female and said, `For this cause shall a man leave his father and mother, and shall cleave to his wife, and the two become one flesh?' ... What therefore God is putting together, let not man put asunder." Matt. 19: 4-6

(Optional) - to the bride and groom

You have declared your consent, spoken your vows, and exchanged your rings: it is now time for the lighting of the Unity candle.

LIGHTING THE UNITY CANDLE

(Three candles have been arranged on a table nearby. The center candle is unlit, the outer two candles are burning – I often have the mother of the bride and the mother of the groom come forward (to open the marriage ceremony) and light the two single candles.

NOTE: When any of them are lighting the candles they should be behind the table so as to make for good pictures.

CAUTION THE BRIDE TO KEEP HER VEIL AWAY FROM FLAMES.

MINISTER: "The two outside candles have been lighted to represent your lives at this moment. They are two distinct lights, each capable of going their separate way. To bring joy and radiance into your home, there must be the merging of these two flames into one." Direct the bride and groom to go behind the table and direct them to pick up the single candles, bring the tips together and together light the center candle. When this is done, have them extinguish the single candles and replace them in holders and:

MINISTER: The center candle represents the union of your two lives into one. As the center light cannot be divided, let not your lives be divided; instead, be the united testimony of a spiritual home.

MINISTER: Let us pray

Heavenly Father, at every turning of life's way, we would stop and seek Thy guidance and Thy blessing. We thank Thee that Thou art Love and that Thou hast created us in Thine own Image. We thank Thee for planting love for woman in the heart of man and love for man in the heart of woman. Richly bless these two lives now to be made one by this bond of love. May they live each for the other and both for Thee. May their home be Thy abiding place and Thou their constant guest. In the name of Jesus Christ, Amen. MINISTER: And now, please join hands, under the authority of the law of our land and in the name of the Holy Spirit who performs every true marriage: I pronounce you. Husband and Wife!

To the groom: You may kiss the bride.
